Fellow Residents:

Hello and let's all thank our lucky stars that spring appears to be here once and for all. The cold of winter is in the rear view mirror but the effects of the prolonged severe cold have left lasting marks. From unprecedented damage to our roads, a phenomenon suffered by all municipalities in northeast Ohio, to three water main breaks in the Village in three consecutive days, winter sure came in with a roar and left with a roar. As always, our police and service workers were kept *very* busy doing their best to make sure Village services continued as normal as possible under the circumstances.

There have been many other happenings, some of the more prominent of which are outlined below.

Cell Tower

Perhaps the most visible of the many issues that Council and the Administration have spent time on over the last several months is Verizon's approach to the Village for consideration of the installation of a cell tower or other facility to improve reception for residents. This issue has prompted a good deal of dialogue both internally and among residents. There appears to be as many different opinions as there are people expressing them as we deal with the issue of melding the historical fabric of the Village with the advancements of modern technology. So a summary of where things currently stand is in order so that all are brought up to date with the current state of facts.

Verizon approached council and the administration several months ago about erecting a cell facility to the rear of the salt bin currently existing behind Village Hall. Historically Waite Hill has not been attractive for such any type of cell facility because of the lack of density in the Village. As a result, we began investigating the pros and cons of Verizon's inquiry. Some of these factors include regular complaints from residents about poor cell service, increased reliance by our police department on the quick and dependable retrieval of mobile digital data while patrolling the Village, some additional revenue for our general fund, and staying abreast of the times as communications technology rapidly moves from traditional landline and hardwired systems to wireless systems and devices. Against these advancements, we try to balance the preservation of our pastoral nature.

So that there is no confusion, **no commitments have been made**, in writing or otherwise, as of this writing. We have engaged in dialogue with Verizon, talked about the parameters of a lease arrangement and the related economics, identified the location of a tower or other facility **if we deem it in the Village's best interests and decide to proceed**, and determined that no tower or facility will be considered if it requires lighting during the night. Beyond those considerations, we are continuing to study the issue.

Furthermore, this system also could be used for any other type of communication, emergencies, or road closures. We have been researching this and I will continue to update you as we find the appropriate system for Waite Hill.

Finances

We ran at an overall cash flow deficit of \$ 263,829 in calendar 2014. This was in line with our forecast and matched our projections when discussing the Safety and Service Levy that was passed at the end of 2013. As we continue to search for solutions, it is important for all to recognize that the Village faces real long-term fiscal challenges because we cannot continue to operate with deficit spending into the indefinite future.

A more detailed reporting of our finances will be the subject of my next newsletter, along with the status of our Village Hall bonds and a not-for-profit entity that has been formed to try to fill the funding void left by the repeal of the Ohio estate tax.

Road Program

To make a long story short and as briefly mentioned above, our roads took a real beating this past winter due to the severe and prolonged cold. As we try to stretch limited dollars to prolong the lives of the roads and defer the outlay of large capital sums for replacement, you will notice much more in the way of repair and remedial work that has been historically undertaken. Sections of roads will be repaired where possible and crack sealing will be extensively implemented to mitigate the damage caused by winter.

New Building Projects

Every year we like to remind our residents that anybody undertaking a building, remodeling or grading project should first check with Village Hall to make sure the necessary approvals are secured **prior to proceeding with any work**. Though some may think otherwise, our intent is not to create unnecessary red tape, delay or other problems. We simply want to ensure that all projects are undertaken in conformity with our existing zoning regulations which are intended to preserve the beauty and fabric of our Village, assets which all residents value.
